Past FOIA Collaborations

- Using a [FOIA about ICE home raids](#), we produced the [Defend Against ICE Raids and Community Arrest Toolkit](#) with information about how ICE chooses who to target for home raids, how they identify individuals, and the evolution of arrest tactics they have used since the G.W. Bush administration in addition to strategies for individuals to defend their right to remain in the U.S. in the wake of a raid. IDP's ICEwatch raids map can be found [here](#).
- We recently settled a [FOIA about Operation Palladium](#). We made many of the [documents](#) about this Trump era aggressive ICE policing operation to target sanctuary cities available on our website. We are currently working on a briefing guide with key takeaways from the production which will be added to the [website](#) in the coming weeks.
- Although we are still litigating a [FOIA about ICE Citizens Academy](#), a little-known public relations effort to bolster support for violent ICE policing tactics, we published a [briefing guide](#) about what we've learned already.

- Tracking [ICE raids in New York](#) which formed the basis for our community education about [ICE ruses](#) and development of community [KYR materials](#) and our [“Train-theTrainer” program](#) for community leaders and organizers.

- The [Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse](#) compiles data about the immigration system and Immigration Courts on an ongoing basis.
